All: Lingokids.

Speaker 2: I think six pizzas can be a bit too much. Remember, a single pizza has a lot of slices, which we can share.

Lisa: Oh, yes. Sharing is great. Plus, we have plenty of other snacks. Maybe two will be enough?

Speaker 2: I think two sounds about right.

Lisa: Let's order.

Lisa: Hi, there. We would like to order two big pizzas, please. Oh, yes. The toppings.

What toppings would we like, everyone?

Cowie: Cheese, please.

Lisa: Make them extra cheesy.

Elliot: Can we add bamboo? I love bamboo.

Lisa: Sorry, Elliot. No bamboo, but they have spinach.

Elliot: Okay, I guess like spinach will do. Just no anchovies, please. They remind me

of our friend, Fishy.

Lisa: Yes, Billy, we can add sesame seeds to one of the pizzas.

Cowie: Let's add some olives as well.

Lisa: Okay, so that will be two big pizzas with spinach and olives. Make it extra cheesy and no anchovies, and add sesame seeds to one of them, please. Great. Thank you. Goodbye. Okay, the pizza is on its way. Let's have some starters while we wait.

All: Yay.

Elliot: Yum.

Cowie: Oh.

Speaker 2: Can you think of how we can cut the pizzas so everyone gets the same amount of pieces of equal size?

Cowie: That's tricky.

Cowie: Why don't we just cut each pizza into five slices?

Speaker 2: Great idea, Cowie. That way everyone gets two slices. One from each pizza.

Cowie: Great idea.

Elliot: But there's one more problem.

Cowie: What is it?

Elliot: Well, I'm allergic to sesame seeds.

Cowie: Oh, no.

Speaker 2: Billy says sorry he forgot to ask you.

Elliot: It's okay, Billy. My fault. I was too busy thinking about that extra cheese Cowie ordered. [laughs]

Cowie: I know. Billy can take two slices from the pizza with the sesame seeds and Elliot can take two slices from the one without seeds. Does that work? Thanks, Billy.

Elliot: That works for me, too.

Lisa: Looks like we figured it out. Great. All this pizza math is making me hungry.

Speaker 2: I'll cut the pizza and we can eat.

Lisa: Yay.

Elliot: This pizza slice is delicious.

Lisa: It sure is.

Speaker 2: Lingokids listeners, thank you for joining us for Lisa's Pizza Party. We had a great time eating pizza, and we saw that pizza can teach us a thing or two about math. Next time you eat pizza, cake, or even pie, think about sharing it and slicing it the way that everyone can enjoy their part. We'll see you next time.
