
Boost your child's knowledge of the key words by trying out these fun activities.



GREEN FINGERS

Gardening is an excellent way to introduce this lesson's vocabulary to your child. A simple task such as de-weeding a driveway can allow your child the opportunity to learn in context. Here are some gardening jobs to get you started: plant some seeds, help to trim plants, re-pot a plant that is blossoming. Use these opportunities to go over the vocabulary by showing the different objects representing the new vocabulary to your child, and ask them to make a drawing labeling each of them once you're done with your gardening duties.



DISAPPEARING WORDS



For this activity you will be reading out one of this lesson's key words for your child to write in water on the sidewalk or driveway. Once they write the word in water using their finger or paintbrush, they can watch it disappear! Extra challenge: have your child recall the new words and write them from memory.

Progress Tracker

Try these activities with your child to assess their knowledge of the key words. You can do this as many times as you like to see how they are progressing. Mark the table with the words they know and don't know, and watch how they improve over time!

TRACKER ACTIVITY 1

Place images or drawings of the key words around the room, you can do this activity outdoors instead if you have a garden. Give your child some blowing bubbles and call out one of the key words. Ask your child to find the correct picture and blow some bubbles in the direction of the correct picture. Repeat this as often as you need in order to ensure understanding and assist your child if they need it.



TRACKER ACTIVITY 2

Give your child a bit of salt dough/playdough/clay. Have them sit in front of you and tell them one of the key words. Wait for them to recreate that concept using the dough. You can reverse the roles to make it more fun but make sure to keep track and mark the results accordingly on the table below.

EXTRA CHALLENGE

RECYCLED WATERING CAN

With your supervision, your child will be litter picking around their home, or used recycled items from other family members or friends. Try to encourage them to think about what could be useful. Create a watering can from an old milk carton, or even grow some plants in your garden or on your window sill from recycled cartons. Decorate the outside of your new invention with this lesson's key words.



GUESSING GAME

For example: flower - it is short, it is colorful, it smells good. Extra challenge: limit the number of tries your child gets per each word to 5 guesses.


ISLAND HOPPING

Draw circles on the sidewalk or driveway creating a path. Have your child write one of this lesson's key words on each island and then add some extra words from previous topics: animals, foods, etc. Your child will have to hop from island to island, reading the word before jumping. If it is a word related to the garden, they can land on the island. If it is a word related to another topic, they must soar over to the next island.



GUIDED DRAWINGS

Give your child a piece of paper and an instrument to draw with- pencil, pen or crayon. You will read out simple instructions for your child to try to follow when they are drawing. You will start with the easier words (seed, flower, gloves, etc) and then get into the more complicated ones (watering can, garden, etc). Here's an example of what your instructions could sound like: draw me a big circle in the middle of the paper, inside the circle draw 7 black dots, etc. You can use your mother tongue to give directions yet your child will have to guess the image in English.



EXTENSION

Show your child what a word search looks like and explain how using these help us learn how to spell new words. This is a fun and effective resource that your child can easily recreate. Ask your child to generate a word search including this lesson's key words and have them 'assess' you with it. How fast can you find all of the new words? Can they make an easy and a difficult word search?








